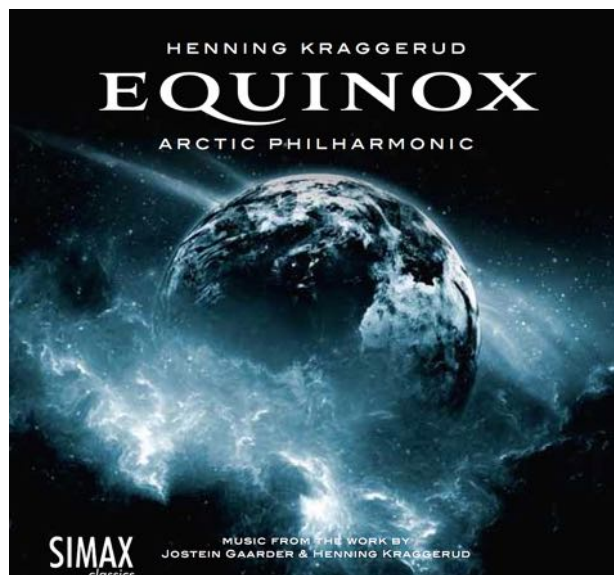

An exploration of time, space, identity, memory and loss in a work for violin, piano and narrator, accompanied by texts from Norwegian author, Jostein Gaarder.

Since the 17th century, theorists, philosophers and composers have discussed the intrinsic properties of musical keys, and their links to time and space. These discussions and ideas inspired Henning Kraggerud and the world-famous author of *Sophie's World*, Jostein Gaarder, to collaborate on *Equinox*.

Equinox comprises four concertos - Afternoon, Evening, Night and Morning - with 25 postludes in all. These postludes are written in 24 keys and depict 24 hours and 24 time zones, taking the listener on a kaleidoscopic tour across the world and time, and journeying through the circle of fifths, beginning in C major. The postludes are by turn joyful, mournful, effervescent and heart-wrenching.

Jostein Gaarder has written an original accompanying 24-part narrative, 24 keys to a world before it slips away, charting a man's journey through time from the Meridian Line in Greenwich, London, which features in live performances of *Equinox*. As he awaits a potentially serious medical diagnosis, the protagonist decides to make the most of his 24 hours of freedom by visiting every time zone.

Equinox can be performed in two halves with narration and lasts two and a half hours. If performed without narration, it is played in a single span lasting 75 minutes. For performances in English, Henning Kraggerud and pianist Clare Hammond are joined by actor Simon Callow, who has just recorded the narration for SIMAX records.

Equinox was premiered in its orchestral version in 2014 at the opening concert of the Northern Lights Festival in Tromsø, and later performed in Norwegian with Jostein Gaarder in Bodø and the Risor Festival. The work has since been played by the NFM Symphony Orchestra, Tallinn Chamber Orchestra, Brussels Philharmonic Orchestra, Auckland Philharmonia and Tonkünstler Orchestra.

Henning's extraordinary reach as an artist is a result of his versatility and passion for music, as well as the genuine quality to his playing and the beauty of his performances. His teaching and educational writings provide fascinating insights into his multi-faceted approach to music-making, while his composing, arranging and improvising – frequently bringing his own works into the concert hall – recall the spirit of the old masters such as Fritz Kreisler and Eugène Ysaÿe.



Henning is invited time and again to join many of the world's most significant orchestras, including the Hallé, BBC Symphony, Oslo Philharmonic, Danish National Symphony, Baltimore Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic and Orpheus Chamber. As a chamber musician, he performs frequently both on violin and viola at major festivals and venues such as BBC Proms, Wigmore Hall, Amsterdam Concertgebouw, Verbier Festival, Hollywood Bowl and Carnegie Hall.

Henning is a prolific composer whose works are performed by many prominent musicians and orchestras around the globe. His largest-scale work to date is entitled *Equinox: 24 Postludes in All Keys for Violin and String Orchestra*. Commissioned, premiered and recorded by the Arctic Philharmonic Chamber Orchestra with Henning as soloist, the work was composed as a musical counterpart to a story specially written by world-famous author Jostein Gaarder, and has been hailed as “endlessly resourceful and surprising” (*BBC Music Magazine*, five stars).

SIMON CALLOW

Simon Callow is an actor of extraordinary versatility whose critically acclaimed stage appearances are complimented by his work as a theatre director, musician and writer. He is well known for his work in film, including *Four Weddings and a Funeral* (1994), *Shakespeare in Love* (1998) and *A Room with a View* (1985), and his one-man stage shows, including *The Mystery of Charles Dickens* by Peter Ackroyd and *Being Shakespeare*.

Simon has written biographies of Oscar Wilde, Charles Laughton and Orson Welles and, as a devotee of classical music, has contributed articles to *Gramophone* magazine. In 1999 he was appointed a Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) for his services to acting.

CLARE HAMMOND

Acclaimed as a pianist of “amazing power and panache” (*The Telegraph*), Clare Hammond is recognised for the virtuosity and authority of her performances and has developed a “reputation for brilliantly imaginative concert programmes” (*BBC Music Magazine*, ‘Rising Star’). In 2016, she won the Royal Philharmonic Society's ‘Young Artist Award’ in recognition of outstanding achievements. Highlights that year included a performance at the Royal Festival Hall with the Philharmonia and a series of three concerts at the Belfast International Arts Festival, broadcast as part of the BBC Radio 3 Lunchtime Concerts series.



In the 2017/18 season, Clare performed Edwin Roxburgh's *Concerto for Piano and Winds* with the BBC Symphony Orchestra under Michael Seal and Panufnik's Piano Concerto with the Warsaw Philharmonic Orchestra under Jacek Kasprzyk. She has just made the world premiere recording of two keyboard concertos by Myslivecek with the Swedish Chamber Orchestra and conductor Nicholas McGegan for BIS Records. BBC Radio 3 and the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra have co-commissioned composer Kenneth Hesketh to write a concerto for Clare, to be premiered in 2019 with the BBC National Orchestra of Wales.

Clare's most recent disc for BIS, of music by Ken Hesketh, has been widely praised with the Observer describing her as a “star interpreter of contemporary music”. Her previous release, ‘Etude’, received unanimous critical acclaim for its “unflinching bravura and conviction” (*Gramophone*) while the BBC Music Magazine stated that “this array of wizardry is not for the faint hearted”.
